Roy Coopervasser's Spring 2006 Journal (an excerpt)

If I had to point to one aspect of the fellowships program from this past semester that has affected my approach towards music in general as well as my place in the world of music, it would definitely be the Fellowship Seminar that focused on the genre of manifesto. In the final paper for this fascinating class, we had

to focus on a defining, pivotal moment in our discipline's history and show how it could be considered a manifesto. The historical moment I chose to focus on was the birth of tape-music, dubbed "Musique Concrete" by its inventor Pierre Schaffer. This moment in modern music history relates directly to me as a member of a breed of musicians I call in my paper "The Science-Musicians." Schaffer revolutionized music in the late 1940s by inventing a technique of manipulating pre-recorded sounds with magnetic tape players. These techniques changed music so overwhelmingly that it is impossible to imagine what music would look like today had these new concepts not been incorporated into music compositions and legitimized by composers and listeners.... Thanks to uncompromising dreamers like Edgard Varese and Ferruccio Busoni and ground-breaking figures like Schaffer, I live in a world that allows me to express myself using sound (not just pitched sound) as raw material, by mastering technology rather than by mastering a musical instrument. And thanks to educators like my mentor, Professor Kozel, who accompanied me through the past four years and helped me open my eyes and broaden my horizons, I am able to understand my place as an artist in the world of music, whether writing my own music or helping other musicians realize theirs. I have great joy in making artistic decisions every day and executing them using the technology I have learned to master.
